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<u>Course Description</u>: During this course, which examines the world of discourse, students will analyze and demonstrate in their own writing the importance of structural elements in a personal narrative, the role of character development and point of view in descriptive writing, the use of literary techniques in poetry, debates, and persuasive essays, and the unifying nature of a theme in an expository essay (Howard County Course Description). These units are intended to help students synthesize their understanding of the elements of literature introduced throughout middle school. All four units integrate literature, composition, and language instruction (Ninth Grade Curriculum).

#### **Learning Objectives/Outcomes:**

At the conclusion of this course it is expected that the students will be able to:

- Identify features of language that create personal voice and tone (1.3.3).
- Use a variety of pre-writing strategies (2.2.1).
- Control language by applying the conventions of Standard English in writing and speaking (CLG 3).
- Identify specific words, phrases, images, and symbols that support a personal response to a poem or persuasive essay (4.1.2).

#### **Armstead's Expectations**:

- Be on time.
  - o Enter the classroom and be seated quietly by the late bell.
  - o Promptly begin working on the warm-up.
- Be prepared.
  - o Bring required materials to class on a daily basis (items listed above).
  - o Students will not be permitted to visit lockers during class time.
- Be attentive.
  - o Pay attention during class: listen and respond appropriately during lessons.
  - Avoid side conversations, passing notes, sleeping, placing head on desk, grooming, and/or eating.
- Be respectful.
  - Respect is expected for the classroom, materials, equipment, peers and teacher
  - o Rude and unkind behavior is unacceptable and will not be tolerated.

#### Classroom Rules:

- There is no eating/drinking (other than water) in the classroom.
- Students must maintain a clean work area. Trash is to be thrown away, desks are to be straightened, and chairs pushed in upon dismissal.
- Tardiness is unacceptable. First time for the year = warning; after the first occurrence consequences will follow school policy. Late students must have a signed pass.
- Students are expected to participate in discussions, group and individual activities, and student presentations.
- When the teacher is speaking or a peer is sharing a response, withhold comments respectfully until called upon.
- Ask topic appropriate questions. Unrelated questions should be asked before/after class or when solicited by Mrs. Armstead.
- Avoid grooming oneself during class: this includes brushing hair; applying makeup; adjusting outfits; spraying perfume, cologne, body splash or deodorant, etc.

#### 4) Hats/Walkman/CD Players/iPods/PSP/Cell Phones and Other Electronics:

These items are not permitted during the school day. Electronic devices are prohibited from 7:20am until 2:10pm. Cell phones must be turned off during the school day. Hats are prohibited from the minute students enter OM until 3:00pm. If any of the above mentioned are seen/heard during the day they will be confiscated until a parent/guardian retrieves them from the front office.

#### **Grading Policy**:

- Assignments: Various activities are assigned over the course of the year, including home/classwork, quizzes, tests, assessments, projects, and formal/informal writing assignments. Point values for these assignments will be determined on a raw point scale. Mrs. Armstead's assignments are not weighted. A rubric is provided for all projects, papers and other writing assignments. Criteria for each of these assignments will be discussed and reviewed in class as activities occur.
- Homework: Homework is an integral part of this course and often acts as a buffer for balancing quiz, test, and project scores. Homework will be assigned nightly and reviewed daily. Typically, any homework assigned dictates or reinforces the next day's activity/discussion. These assignments usually range between 10 and 20 points.
- Extra Credit: Extra credit rarely occurs. Do not request extra credit assignments or projects, as these do not exist.

• Student Feedback: Students will receive one grade report printout prior to interim reports and one grade report printout prior to quarterly report cards to ensure

- progress awareness. Teacher/student conferences will occur randomly throughout the quarter. Parents and/or students may request grade printouts via conference, email, or telephone conversation.
- Make-up Work: If absent you are required to bring in a signed and dated (parent/guardian) note explaining the absence. Present this to your first period teacher and he/she will fill out a pass; this is to be initialed by all teachers. Make-up work is not assigned until this procedure is fulfilled. Amount of days absent = the number of days to complete the work. If you exceed the number of allotted days or fail to communicate with the teacher, you will receive a zero for incomplete work. Unexcused absences = an automatic zero.
- If you exceed 9 days of unexcused or a combination of excused/unexcused absences (everyday class) or 4.5 days (every other day class) you are likely to be denied credit. See your teacher.
- Late Work: Late assignments are not accepted. A minimum of 10% per day (teacher discretion) will be deducted for late projects and formal writing assignments. Missing assignments severely affect your grade.
